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Project Lifesaver

At the December parent support group, PTI sponsored a presentation about Project Lifesaver. Representatives from the Green Country Pilot Club, Washington County Sheriff's Department, and The Salvation Army spoke to parents about this community service. Project Lifesaver is a way to track and quick-

ly find people who might wander off due to conditions such as Alzheimer's, Autism, or Dementia. A participant wears a transmitter on a wristband that produces a unique frequency which can be tracked by the sheriff's department. The initial cost is \$300 and there is a monthly fee of \$25. A participant's care-

giver checks the battery daily while a volunteer from the Green Country Pilot Club will come to change the battery each month. Call The Salvation Army at 918-336-6454 for more information.

All About. . . Jody Gibson

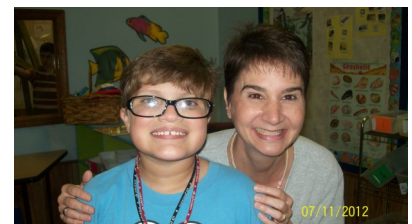
Jody started out as a dedicated volunteer for PTI this summer. She liked it so much, she asked to become a staff member
