New Activity Additions - Art Therapy and Music Classes

Pam Rice, an art therapist from Tulsa, is going to start coming to PTI once a month to work with our students. Pam has a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the University of Tulsa. She is also a Licensed Professional Counselor and a Registered Art Therapist. Pam has experience working with children with autism in Tulsa. PTI is seeking a grant through the Oklahoma Arts Council to increase the amount of time we can have her work with our students.



Rhonda Cerveny, registered Music Together teacher, will start teaching a music class at PTI once a week in November. Rhonda has a Bachelor of Music degree in Commercial Vocal Performance and a MA in Music Education. Rhonda has taught for 16 years and is enthusiastic about teaching music. Music is an important part of language development, so we are thrilled to have Rhonda bring more music to PTI.



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Visit to Rose Rock Academy

On October 5, Clair Bartley, PTI director, and Debbie Loafman, fellow board member and PTI's Speech Pathology Consultant, traveled to Oklahoma City to meet with Paul Boer, the administrator of Rose Rock Academy's school. This is a 51 bed in-patient treatment facility for students diagnosed with autism. Currently, there are 36 children being served at Rose Rock in four classrooms (two verbal and two non-verbal classes). Students are admitted here when they are unable to successfully attend public school. The average in-patient stay varies, but about 90 days was reported to be the average. The goal of treatment here is for a student to return home and reenroll in the public school setting.

Clair and Debbie toured the campus and saw the classrooms, cafeteria, a dormitory and the administrative offices. They were able to meet teachers as well as several of the campus administrators before they headed back up the turnpike to PTI.



Visit to Project Search

Clair Bartley and Jean Jensen visited Mercy Hospital in Oklahoma City on October 9th to learn about Project Search. Project Search is a nine-month internship program for High School Seniors or Post-secondary young adults with disabilities. It is targeted for students whose goal is competitive employment. The program takes place in a host business site where students participate in three internships to explore a variety of career paths. The student s work with a team that includes their family, a special education teacher, and a Rehabilitation Services Administrator. The team's job is to support each student during their transition form school to work.. We are hoping to start a similar program in Bartlesville to help students with autism spectrum disorders make a successful transition to adulthood.


