

Music with Ms. Rhonda

Rhonda Cerveny has livened up our Monday afternoons by bringing music into our lives. Rhonda teaches every Monday afternoon from 3:15-3:45. PTI's students have enjoyed Rhonda's enthusiastic style as she works with everyone on singing, rhythm, movement, body awareness, active listening, and self-expression. We use sticks and shakers to produce rhythms and to participate in musical activities. Each child, as well as the classroom, received their own CD's with

songs from class. Students love to listen to the songs over and over again between Ms. Rhonda's visits. Incorporating music into our school program will benefit our students' language development, cognitive growth, emotional growth, social growth, and physical development. We look forward to Ms. Rhonda's classes each week.





Rethink Autism

Rethink Autism is a comprehensive curriculum and training program based on the principles of applied behavior analysis. Each student at PTI has an individual account with individualized curriculum. Curriculum is based on the results of a simple online assessment completed by a teacher or parent. Skills addressed include pre-academic, academic, social/emotional, expressive language, receptive language, play/leisure, and daily living. Each parent receives a login so they can access their child's progress.. In addition, Rethink Autism has a strong training component that is beneficial to both staff and parents. PTI uses Rethink Autism as one component of a comprehensive school program.



January Parent Support Group Meeting

PTI hosts a monthly support group for parents of children with autism spectrum disorders. At the January 22nd meeting, parents of high school and adult students with ASD will talk about seeking guardianship, financial planning, adult programs, job seeking, and other adult issues. This meeting will be perfect for parents of younger or older children who are beginning to think about the future.
